June 29, 1844

We continue today a list of the places which the Bishop will visit during the ensuing month.

Washington, Guernsey County, 1st July.

St. Pius, Steubenville, 4th do.

St. Paul's, Columbiana Co., 7th do.

St. John's, Canton, Stark Co., 10th do., and other Stations at the discretion of the Pastor during the week.

Louisville, Stark Co., 14th do.

Massillon, 16th do.

Fulton, 18th do., and such other stations as the Pastor may appoint during the week.

St. Francis X., Chippewa, 21st. Akron and other Stations left to the judgement of the Pastor as to time and visit.

Our Lady of the Lake, Cleveland, 28th do., and such other places as the Pastor may appoint.

St. Alphonso, Norwalk, 2d August.

July 13, 1844

STEUBENVILLE, July 4th, 1844.

EPISCOPAL VISITATION. -- There are several rising towns along the Muskingum from Marietta towards McConnellsville, such as Lowell, Beverly, Waterford, Windsor, that will soon require the services of more than one priest. We had no time to do more than touch at some of them on our way to St. James' church, in which eighteen persons were confirmed. High Mass was sung by Rev. Mr. McCaffrey, with the

assistance of a choir instructed by an Irish Catholic, Mr. Carroll, who has likewise formed choirs in St. Francis, Sunday Creek; St. Michael's Deavertown; St. Louis, Rehoboth; and in St. Mary's, Marietta. This young man has sufficient acquaintance with the theory and practice of church music, to teach persons to sing plain Masses and the most approved and edifying hymns, both Latin and English. He has certainly done much, in a simple, unostentatious way, to promote the singing of pious hymns by the youth of this part of the diocese. This is a thing which we have all along desired, and we have little doubt that if Mr. Carroll should go to Cincinnati, he would train a large singing school. The cultivation of Sacred Music among the youth we look upon as one of the most effective means of rendering piety attractive and popular and filling their minds with sentiments of devotion and zeal. Sectarians understand this well and have thus allured many a youth, especially in places where there is no Catholic church, to their meeting-houses and their errors.

The Church of Archer's settlement is finished. It was blessed, and there were seventeen persons confirmed. Here, as in every station we have visited, there were converts prepared to receive the holy sacraments, and Catholics who had strayed from the faith, were reclaimed, and persons in imminent danger of the shipwreck of faith, or morals, were happily preserved.

At the wild, rough place called Crow's Nest [Crane's Nest], on the Little Muskingum, we found the chapel of S.S. Peter and Paul not yet finished -- there were eleven persons confirmed. The Bishop preached in the evening in the court-house of Woodsfield, where he was hospitably entertained by Mr. Morris, the member of congress from this district, and the next day himself and Rev. Mr. Shonot preached in the beautiful, large and finely situated church of St. John, near Malaga, in which there were fifteen persons confirmed. The following day three were twenty-five persons confirmed in St. Dominic's, Guernsey Co., and the next day, twenty-two persons were confirmed, after Mass, in the house of Mr. Edward Lawn, Washington, same county. In the afternoon, the congregation walked in procession through the town, accompanied by a band of music; which kindly volunteered its services on the occasion, and followed by Rev. Mr. McCallion in cassock and surplice, and the Bishop with mitre and crosier, to the site of a new church, the corner-stone of which was placed according to the prescriptions of the Roman Ritual, after a sermon by the Bishop. The church will be leightly by forty-five feet, in the Gothic style, and dedicated to God under the invocation of Ireland's glorious apostle. The site has been generously presented to us by Mr. Jacob Umstott, to whom we beg here to record our obligations, the more so as Mr. Umstott is not a professor of the Catholic faith.

Next day the Bishop preached in the court-house at St. Clairsville, and the following morning confirmed four persons in the house of a German Catholic, Mr. Urnbruster, where the Divine Sacrifice was offered by Rev. Messrs. Shonot and Foley, the former having also preached in German to a small congregation. Rev. Messrs. Comerford of Wheeling and McCallion were also present. One of the four confirmed was a convert, Mr. Robert Payne of Northampton, England, and it is remarkable that in nearly every place where this holy rite has been administered,

during the present visitation, there were English persons presented to receive it. Is it unreasonable to attribute this to the Association of prayers founded by Rev. and Hon. Mr. Spencer, for the conversion of England! The whole number confirmed in this district is ninety-four. The Bishop has been induced to associate Rev. Mr. Foley with Rev. Mr. McCallion in the labors of this extensive and increasing mission.

July 20, 1844

July 27, 1844

EPISCOPAL VISITATION. -- There were 19 confirmed at Steubenville on the 7th of July; 116 at St. Paul's, Columbiana County, on the 14th, and 119 in Canton of the 17th instant.

August 10, 1844

The Rev. Mr. Senez of Paris, has also arrived to labor in the American missions. He has, like many of his zealous countrymen, surrendered the endearments of home, to devote his life in the cause of religion in the diocese of Cincinnati.

September 14, 1844

NEWARK, Sept. 5, 1844.

EPISCOPAL VISITATION. -- [Attica, Seneca County; Louisville, Stark Co.; St. Fidelis, four miles from Waynesburgh, Carroll County.]

In the church of St. John of the Cross, four miles from Bolivar, there were twenty-nine confirmed, many more having been prevented by the state of the weather from attending. There was also a German lady, a convert, confirmed in Bolivar. In St. Clements, Bethlehem, there were twenty-one confirmed. A new church is to be erected here, next Spring.

[Massillon; Fulton]

At St. Genevieve, six miles from Mt. Eaton, Holmes Co., there were thirteen confirmed. This little church is twelve miles from Massillon and as many from Millersburgh, Holmes Co. Here we were met by our excellent and aged friend, Mr. George Sapp, who had come to convey us to St. Luke's, near Danville, Knox Co. The church, though so lately built, is already much too small. The day was stormy and wet, but there was so great a crowd collected, the Bishop had to manage as well as he might to preach in the open air, as had been, indeed necessary, at many other stations where the audience could not have adjourned to a court-house, as at Tiffin and Canton. There were one hundred and thirty confirmed of whom, at least, one third were converts, to whom their fervent pastor, Rev. Mr. Lamy, had preached a week's retreat to prepare them for their adoption as the living tabernacle of the Divine Saviour and the Holy Spirit. Of the converts we may record the names of many imbued, in their youth with deep prejudices against our holy faith and who are now most edifying trophies of divine grace -- Mr. Buckingham, seventy-five years of age, and his five children -- Mr. Edgar Brest of London, the last of a family of seven persons, thus blessedly converted, like so many others, from the errors of

the Church of England; Mrs. Barbara Walsh, Mr. Walker, Mrs. Morton, five of the name of Sappe, Mr. Shulta, Mr. Dyer, Mr. Zimmorman, Mr. Shultz's two sisters-in-law, with several more, natives of the U. States, some of whom had been Lutherans and others Baptists.

The following day we were at St. Joseph's, a German congregation, nine miles from St. Luke's, in Holmes Co. The church occupies very nearly the highest ground in Ohio. The hills around this romantic spot are bolder and more solitary than those of Guernsey, or Athens. There were three confirmed. The duties of these missions are too many and too arduous for one pastor. In attending this portion of his flock, Rev. Mr. Lamy has frequently had to swim his horse across the Mohican and was once near perishing in attempting to pass it in a frail boat with a company of fourteen persons. It is the intention of the Bishop to associate with him on those missions a brother-priest of the diocese of Clermont, who is to accompany Rev. Mr. Machbeuf on his return from France. A new residence is to be built on a suitable lot, near St. Luke's church, for their accommodation.

St. Vincent's church, Mt. Vernon, which was burned last Spring, is not yet rebuilt. This, however, is not so much for want of means, as of materials, in the getting out whereof some unavoidable delays have occurred. The citizens of Mt. Vernon, as soon as the misfortune above-mentioned befell the congregation, generously subscribed some six hundred dollars to repair it. The Bishop preached to a very large assemblage in the court-house.

St. Francis of Sales church, Newark, is nearly finished. It is quite a handsome building and large, on a two-acre lot, the highest one of the town plot of the capital of Licking. This is unquestionably, one of the most spirited congregations in the diocese. Without saying much about it, they purchased this fine lot, built

the church and provided it with a fine silver chalice, as well as some other articles of less value. Rev. Mr. Lamy has erected the presbytery, a neat and appropriate dwelling for two priests. The other congregations will be rather edified than otherwise, when we state that notwithstanding the highly commendable and successful efforts which they have also made in this respect, the choir of Newark surpasses any other out of Cincinnati, in this diocese. There were only thirteen prepared for confirmation, as the Bishop's visit was not generally known in time. Rev. Mr. Senz has been appointed by the Bishop pastor of this congregation and also of those of Lynnville, six miles distant, and Johnstown, eighteen miles north-west of Newark.

December 14, 1844

The church of the Nativity, Portsmouth, is now handsomely finished. It will be dedicated, God willing, on New-Year's day. Rev. Mr. Butler and Rev. Mr. Wood, will preach in English, in the forenoon and afternoon and Rev. Mr. Emig, S.J., in German.
